Topic	variable, different focal points can be set as desired
Method	utopia workshop / scenario workshop
Age	from 12 years
Group size	any
Required time	2 - 4 h, depending on requirements

Goals of the workshop

Positive thinking, inspiration	Discussion techniques and methods are used to break down thought barriers. Ideas for the future and desires are specified.
Motivation for change	By letting your mind wander and "thinking big", new motivation for change can arise.
Joy	The method should give the participants joy and hope for the future. The participants' self-efficacy should be activated.
Together instead of alone?	A sense of community is created through shared experiences and daydreaming. The participants are not alone with their desires.

Introduction / Presentation	Presentation	<p>At the beginning of the workshop, teamGLOBAL is introduced. An introduction to the topic of "utopias" follows.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> □ Who are we? □ What are we doing today? □ What is a utopia? What do you imagine a utopia to be? <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Collect associations ○ Attention: risk of framing ○ Dixit cards can be selected as an aid 	The participants arrive. They get involved in the workshop thematically. First chains of association arise.	Depending on how the associations turn out, more or less input on the topic should be provided.
Warm-up	Utopian charging	<p>Chains of associations are formed. The participants gather in a circle. In turn, ideas / words / concepts are said / thrown in.</p> <p>Dixit cards are used as an introductory impulse. It is up to the workshop leader whether they want to place several Dixit cards in the center, give one card as an impulse, have a participant choose a Dixit card, etc.</p>	Participants let their thoughts flow freely and develop ideas. A space is opened up for creative, imaginative ideas that are free from norms. The exercise can and should be fun.	The exercise is based on the "Yes, and ..." - method from impro theater. The aim is to build on the previous contribution and develop an idea further. What was previously said is taken as given and not criticized. Therefore, each sentence begins with "Yes, and ..."
Work phase	Utopia workshop	<p>The workshop leader poses a guiding question to everyone: "My perfect world is ..."</p> <p>This question is answered with an adjective. Participants can design their utopias in groups or individually and create posters (collages, mind maps, painting/drawing).</p>	The participants develop various utopias. These are visualized using creative methods.	<p>The question can be written on a flipchart to illustrate it.</p> <p>The collection of materials contains a question catalog that can support the development of the utopias.</p> <p>It may be necessary to limit the utopia development thematically: e.g. school.</p>
	Utopia sharing	The participants present their utopias. The individual posters are hung up in the room where they are clearly visible. Everyone has the opportunity to look at the posters quietly and let them sink in. This is followed by a "utopia viewing": The posters are looked at together and	The utopias and the work of the participants are appreciated. Inspiration can be drawn for one's own utopia.	The presentation is voluntary. If necessary, only aspects can be presented. There is no right or wrong!

	Back to the future	<p>Past tense is used to talk about the achievement of the utopias. If the utopia has been achieved, how did it happen?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <input type="checkbox"/> What steps were taken to achieve the utopia? <input type="checkbox"/> What has been achieved? <input type="checkbox"/> What alliances were there to achieve this? 	Concrete steps to achieve the utopias are recognized. These are broken down into concrete actions. This should make the achievement of utopias less "fantastic" and distant, but more tangible and realizable.	<p>This step is more suitable for older groups, as it requires a certain amount of planning, organization and abstraction skills.</p> <p>The ideas can also be recorded in writing. A concrete action plan can be developed from the individual ideas.</p>
Conclusion	Examples	Some "utopias" that became reality are presented. (see collection of materials)	The participants see that it is possible to make supposed utopias come true. At best, they are motivated to put their own ideas into practice.	Fantastic library
Reflection	<p>Different methods are possible:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <input type="checkbox"/> On another poster, each participant paints/draws a utopian association. At the end, a joint picture is created (e.g. getting into action = drawing a hand, green future = drawing a tree) <input type="checkbox"/> Packing a suitcase: A suitcase is drawn on a poster. The participants write in the suitcase what they would like to take with them for the future. <input type="checkbox"/> Dixit cards: Dixit cards are laid out and each person can choose a card that matches the workshop. <input type="checkbox"/> Five-finger method <input type="checkbox"/> Etc. 		The experience is recalled. The participants should think about their day again.	Depending on the group, different reflection methods are suitable.

Question Catalog

No “yes/no” questions
“How and why” questions
Various topics can be incorporated, depending on the focus of the workshop/ age group of the participants

Utopia in the context of school:

Examples of Utopia Come True

Hundertwasserschule Lutherstadt Wittenberg

The pupils at a school in Lutherstadt Wittenberg thought about how they could make their school more beautiful during art lessons in the early 1990s. As the pupils' designs resembled the buildings of the artist Friedensreich Hundertwasser, they contacted him. Hundertwasser personally designed the plans for the exterior façade of the building, which were implemented during renovation works.

The interior of the school is also reminiscent of Hundertwasser's style. Here the pupils were able to have a go and be creative themselves.

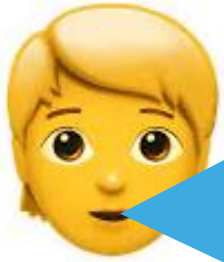

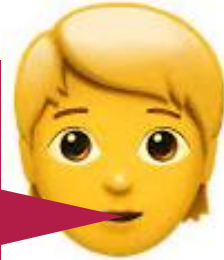
